MODERATOR: INTRODUCTION AND INSTRUCTIONS.

MODERATOR—I WANT TO TALK ABOUT THINGS AND GET YOUR OPINIONS. OBVIOUSLY, EVERYBODY AROUND THE TABLE IS UNDER THIRTY-YEARS-OLD. A LOT OF TIMES WE TALK ABOUT AMERICAN HISTORY IN TERMS OF GENERATIONS, BABY BOOMERS, GENERATION X, THE IDEA OF BEING WITH PEOPLE OF THE SAME AGE WHO HAVE SIMILAR EXPERIENCES, SIMILAR ATTITUDES AND SIMILAR WAYS OF DEALING WITH THE WORLD AROUND THEM. MODERATOR—WHAT KINDS OF THINGS?

The internet. Our lives revolve around it. That's the biggest thing I can think of.

I'd say that we are more technologically sophisticated, but less spiritually advanced. I think we have a lot less understanding of our inner worlds than our parents and our grandparents did, especially our grandparents.

Just the whole thing of technology, having cell phones attached to us at all times. Faxes, the whole technology boom has a made a real difference of how we live our lives on a daily basis.

Fast.

Yeah.

You can do business with somebody and never meet them face to face. It's over the computer and telephone and you have no idea what they look like. Back then it was old fashioned. You kind of meet somebody and you have a conversation face to face. And you don't do that anymore.

It seems like it's really, really gotten individualistic as a culture. It used to be like community and collective as a culture. There was such a community feeling, everybody knew each other and knew each other's name. There was more of like a barter system. It seems like with people's businesses, it was I can't pay you but let me give you some of this corn or what not. And now you never see people. It's very strange. I have my checks direct deposited, so the numbers in my bank account like fluctuate and then I just pay those. It's numbers going up and down, but I never even see the money. It's kind of bizarre.

To be honest, I agree with all of the technical stuff. Even with how we do business now, I never even meet any of my customers. I sit at home and I work from home and I'm twenty-five-years-old and twenty-four. It's kind of weird you know. Back then I'm sure they used to like meet and greet and everything.

It's just not personal anymore.

It's such a trap too. Speaking as an artist, a lot of my art is focused aroundwe've got these leashes, these cell phones, nobody is connecting with anybody anymore. And that's what art is supposed to be about, connecting with people. I've got a cell phone with me right now. And



when somebody tells me to turn it off, I get annoyed. I might get a phone call. So it's hard because on the inside you know it's wrong, there is something wrong with it. But that's the world we live in.

You can obtain information a lot easier too. If I need to figure something out I can go pull up the internet and just look it up right away. But back then, they'd have to go home or to the library, it was just harder for them to figure it out. Read about, ask somebody, where literally for us it's just going to phone right here and looking it up.

And what's positive also is as the years go by with medical, all the research they've done and with our parents and grandparents generation, they didn't have certain cures for things like our generation does now. And people are living longer because of it. That's a positive thing.

MODERATOR—WHAT ELSE IS UNIQUE ABOUT YOUR GENERATION?

Transportation, hybrid cars.

We are not as insulated as our parents and our grandparents are. The world is smaller. It's more of a multi-cultural vibe to our generation. We don't worry so much about things like race or even sexuality nowadays. But as a result, we've become more homogenized too. The differences aren't appreciated.

I agree with what everybody says as far as technology goes. I can definitely say I think we are a lot more money driven, a lot more career oriented than past generations have been. A lot more revolves around finance, at least from what I can see.

MODERATOR—DO THE REST OF YOU GUYS THINK THAT YOUR GENERATION IS DRIVEN BY MONEY?

MODERATOR—WHY IS THAT?

TV tells them to. You've got to have this.

Credit cards are great.

I just think it's a really fast-paced environment. It's not like it used to be. You can do so much more in an hour today than you could have thirty years ago. It's not like hey, let's go get corn from the fields. Let's just call it in and get it delivered straight to my house. Everything is faster. The money goes faster, comes faster, just life is so fast-paced right now.

You can even trade in the stock market now online and they couldn't do that back then. I'm sure they had brokers and what not to, but I can just sit there and watch charts all day and watch my money go up and down, up and down. And probably back in the 60's, they couldn't do that.

But are people happier? I don't think so. I think they are more stressed out.

Yeah, they do it to themselves too.

I think it's the environment of the people.

There are people that aren't like that.

MODERATOR—IS THAT A FUNCTION OF LIVING IN LA? IS IT THE SAME WAY IN OTHER PARTS OF THE COUNTRY?

You can get sucked into it.

LA is definitely different than a lot of other cities.

I think any big city you go into.

Yeah.

Yeah.

I've never lived in a small city or small town, so I really could not compare, but living in two large cities, I'd say yeah with those cities I've lived in, most definitely.

I've traveled to a lot of random armpits of America and when I was there, people are fast-paced. The kids are trying to do as much as they can. You've got eighteen-year-old kids starting a



company online. I just see so much...people just doing things. It's all kind of artificial because it's all online. You don't meet any body, no conversation, it's telephone or computer.

MODERATOR—DOES IT PRESENT YOU GUYS WITH MORE OPPORTUNITY THAN PREVIOUS GENERATIONS?

I think it just takes away from the social contact and interaction with people. It's a downfall.

MODERATOR—ON THE ONE HAND YOU'VE GOT YOUR CELL PHONES, ALL THIS DIFFERENT TECHNOLOGY THAT ALLOWS YOU TO CONNECT WITH PEOPLE ANY WAY YOU WANT TO. ON THE OTHER HAND YOU GUYS ARE TELLING ME THAT YOU ARE MORE DISCONNECTED.

There's a lot more opportunity to make money, do business and communicate about things that are maybe materially very important, but in a larger sense not that important. It's like Warhol or somebody said, you've got seven hundred channels and nothing is on TV. Maybe it was Springsteen. There is all this communication, but nobody is saying anything of value.

Nobody touches each other anymore. There's like a bubble of personal space around anyone. Even in the grocery store at line, if people get too close you are like....it's very strange. When you go somewhere else, people just come right up to you and hug you, like in other countries. People are really touchy and it's not a problem, but here everybody is just hands off. It's really bizarre.

And everyone is like sue happy. Everyone wants to sue everybody. And I'm sure like back in the 50's and 60's, people weren't suing everybody for like spilling some soda on them or something.

Spill your hot coffee, well you expect it to be hot.

People actually valued something. Nowadays people just throw the values out the window.

More or less, people are trying to get rich very quick now, very, very quick. Everyone has always wanted to get rich quick, but now it's just like how can I scam somebody or

MODERATOR—WHY IS THAT?

I'd say a lot of it is because of the internet. You can get anything right now. Wickipedia, you go on Wickipedia and you find it and you've got thirty seconds. You are done.

You just get used to that.

Or it's like someone who has a slower computer than someone else and you are like, my God your computer is so slow. It's like, what you can't wait thirty more seconds? They want it now.

MODERATOR—WHAT ARE YOUR VALUES, WHAT IS IT THAT MOTIVATES YOU AND DICTATES THE WAY THAT YOU LIVE YOUR LIFE?

Money. Everything I do from sun up to sundownI run my own business from home. I wake up, preparing faxes all day. I have money now invested in the stocks and stuff. I'm watching charts go up and down. I'm just money motivated from sun up to sundown.

Work hard and be a good person.

MODERATOR—WHAT DOES THAT MEAN TO BE A GOOD PERSON?

Take care of people and just to be a positive person and hope that everything around me is positive. Take care of me and God will take care of me.

Obviously if I'm doing well at work, but friends and family are like pretty important. If you've got a good group of friends and you can actually talk to your family, it's a pretty big deal. And just being a good person. I don't know if it's as much of like a religious thing, but being a good person is the main goal of everything. I guess that's it.

My priority is just to take care of my family, to live ethically as a person, as an artist, and to make a statement, leave a footprint. Something positive.

Just waking up and being happy with what you are doing in life. There are those times in my life when I wake up and I think, I don't want to be in LA anymore. I've been here for twenty-six years and then I'm like, I love it here. But that motivates me to stay here and figure out what



else I can do and be happy. And appreciate my new house I just bought. And put time and effort into it.

It's doing the best you can do, but at the same time some sort of fulfillment at the end of the day. Trying to assess the situation and come up with the best decision, and hopefully accomplish something in life. And do something that you love to do on a daily basis so you don't completely hate the time that you are here.

For me it's just success. Success drives me, to accomplish the goals that I set for myself. Treat people well like I want to be treated.

MODERATOR—YOU USED THE PHRASE LEAVING A FOOTPRINT, WHAT DOES THAT MEAN TO YOU?

Okay, like I said, I act and direct in plays. And if I can make a statement, let somebody know what my world view is, that's my medium and that's how I do it. And if I can make someone see something a different way, an issue, or a facet of life in a way that they hadn't seen it before, then I feel like that is leaving a footprint. Whether that's a political statement, a social statement or a statement about how you get by just walking down the street everyday. That's what I mean by leaving a footprint.

MODERATOR—DO YOU THINK BY AND LARGE THAT YOUR GENERATION IS DRIVEN BY A DESIRE TO HELP OTHERS, TO DO SOMETHING FOR THE GREATER GOOD, NOT JUST FOR THEMSELVES? OR DO YOU THINK IT'S MOSTLY...

No, I think it's very self motivated.

Self motivated.

Very self centered.

I think we are learning to be selfish, but also not be that negative selfishness. I think you have to look at yourself, but you also have to look at others. And to be selfish or to not be selfish is a kind of medium where we are all learning how to do...especially now I'm learning how to learn about myself, to dedicate time to myself, but also to others. It's a balance in life. I think we are all learning how to do it.

It all depends on who you associate yourself with. We are all self centered, but there are organizations like Green Peace, there are plenty of Christians, everyone has their certain drive. You really can't just say the generation in whole is self motivated and self centered and stuff.

I think maybe selfish is kind of a strong word. Some people definitely are. There is a good percentage of the people that are just money motivated and selfish, but I think most of us are pretty self interested. MODERATOR—WHAT DO YOU GUYS DO IN YOUR OWN LIVES TO TRY TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

Volunteer for political candidates.

I take home all the stray animals. They are all living at my house.

I work at the shelter and I try to help people that are dying of terminal illness because it's really hard when you have to go to the grocery store and you can't breathe and...I've been through that and people run screaming from you when you are sick or hurt or need help or someone in your family dies. People kind of throw a casserole at you or write you a check. That really doesn't help a whole lot when you need help. Through the hospital I know a lot of people and a doctor will tell me, so and so needs help grocery shopping or help with Christmas or something. Just go to the store for people or take people out to the store or the aquarium or the museum. When you are stuck in a bed or in a wheelchair, it is just not that fun. It's real easy to get down and let it go. I know a lot of young people who are sick and who are fighting for a chance. I try to take people out and show them a good thing. Anything, like take them to the library, anything they want to do.

For the past few years I've worked at a lot of corporate companies doing a lot of corporate events. I try to tie in a lot of non-profits with the corporate companies, where 50% of the sales of what they are doing anyway or it's just kind of putting them in a spotlight, possibly get more money to try to put them in the right position. There are a lot of non-profits who are looking to get that extra money. It's worked out a little bit.

MODERATOR—HOW WOULD YOU LABEL THE VALUES OF YOUR GENERATION?

I tend to think this stuff is a Madison Avenue creation. I tend to think that liberal and conservative, that's how you get voters and that's it. You get them to label themselves.

I think we all have our views. We all are conservative one way and very liberal in another way. But there are definitely things that I feel are conservative and definitely things that are very liberal, but...

MODERATOR—HOW ABOUT THE REST OF YOU? WHAT DOES PROGRESSIVE MEAN TO YOU AS A LABEL?

I was at a party last week and it was a liberal republican party and there was nothing but like gay people over the age of 50. It was weird. I have never seen nothing like that. It was a fundraiser for Giuliani or something like that. I felt very out of place there. It's definitely an experience. But they were liberals and they were republicans and I don't know if those go in the same category, but they were gay and over the age of fifty.

MODERATOR-ANY OTHER LABELS THAT YOU THINK BETTER FIT? WHAT I HEAR FROM YOU GUYS IS THAT YOU DON'T WANT ANY LABELS. YOU DON'T WANT TO HAVE ANYTHING ATTACHED TO YOUR VALUES.

Who wants to be labeled?

I think nowadays everyone is so much different now. People are so different than like forty years ago, it's hard to put a label on just a certain generation because I'm sure everyone here is completely different. MODERATOR—DO YOU THINK PEOPLE IN YOUR GENERATION ARE MORE INDIVIDUALISTIC, MORE CUSTOMIZING THEIR LIVES AND NOT FOLLOWING CATEGORIES AND GUIDELINES?

I live in Silver Lake and it's hipsterville 101. Everyone there dresses the same, listens to the same music, drives the same car. You very rarely you find anyone that's out of the norm. And if you are out of the norm, you stick out like a sore thumb.

But you think you are being a very individual person, but then like the girl next to you is wearing the same outfit as you and you are like, okay....

Living in Long View has made me realize that everyone is different. Everyone looks different out there. But I think just in general, the big picture of America, the style out here is obviously a lot different than the style in Delaware, New York, Miami or Vegas and everything. So really you can't just put a label on the whole generation because every style in every city in every part of America is different. Some people on the farms, they were born and raised like I'm supposed to buck hay and all that stuff, whereas people out here think they need a Mercedes Benz and do whatever. In New York, people are like on Wall Street and stuff.



I think there is a huge group of people, too, that liberals and conservatives fall under. They choose it because their parents chose it. And that's just how they were raised. It's a big deciding factor on what you decide. My dad was a conservative and I'd probably be wearing a suit right now at some board meeting somewhere and agree with everything he agreed with. They are busier and to be honest with you, I think it's more financially sound.

You have time to work towards your goals and you get the money saved up and you are able to take care of a family.

That's just what we are told though.

But, I'd wait till my later 30's to do that. What everybody is saying with technology, the way medicine is these days, women can wait that long and still be able to have children.

I think sometimes just from my own experience, like growing up in the suburbs of Chicago, all my friends were like having kids, getting married, everyone seems to want to get a job and get through life, live an average life. You come out here and all of a sudden everything is all fast paced. Even like meeting a girl and having a girlfriend is completely out of the question. Like in Chicago, you were dating this person, having a kid, getting married, weddings and all that stuff.

That's why they do online dating now. People don't know how to meet people anymore in person.

Once again, it's all where you are from. In the suburbs of Chicago, online dating is not like a popular thing. Out here in LA, people are meeting people on My Space, Craig's List, Face Book. You are meeting strangers all over the place.

I lived in Indianapolis before I moved out here and that was the way it was, high school, go to college, had a girlfriend throughout college, get married, have kids, that's it.

Then you get a good job, live an average life and that's it. Out here it's just like, bam, bam, spend money on BMW's, buy \$5,000 watches and stuff, just buying all this garbage. It's a crazy lifestyle.



MODERATOR—YOU MENTIONED MY SPACE, FACE BOOK, ALL THESE DIFFERENT TECHNOLOGIES, HOW DO YOU THINK THEY AFFECT YOUR ABILITY TO COMMUNICATE WITH ONE ANOTHER?

That's the way to communicate now. That's how I talk to my little sister, my brother. We don't call each other, we e-mail each other, leave little stupid comments on My Space. It's like an everyday thing.

Life is definitely put out there.

But we do it to ourselves. I'm old fashioned. I send birthday cards. I don't know how many of you guys do that, but...

MODERATOR—YOU SEND LIKE ACTUAL...

Yeah, of course. I love getting cards, do you guys?

I don't remember the last time I got a birthday card.

Credit card companies send birthday cards.

The company you work for.

We don't know people's names, we know their e-mail address, their e-mail name.

And at the same time while you are on My Space and let me ask you a question, how many of you guys have more than a hundred friends on My Space? More than fifty?

I don't have a My Space.

I don't do My Space.

You may have more people that you meet on there, but the relationships are more shallow. You don't really know them.

That's not necessarily true. I've lived in LA, grew up in LA, I've got like four hundred friends and I know about three hundred and fifty of them. I have acquaintances going to school, working with them, friends of friends or hanging out with them.

There is an element of ...it's not the same kind of friendships or relationships that you would necessarily have before. You had to put more effort into them.



It's a way to keep track of my college buddies. I went on a lot of study abroad trips and a lot of the people came from different parts of the country and it's just been like really hard to stay in touch. I've changed my phone number and moved several times. I know a lot of people have gotten married and changed their names, so that's why I use it, to keep in touch.

I don't condemn it. I do the same thing. I'm saying ...

MODERATOR—THAT'S WHAT I'M TRYING TO GET AT, WHAT DO YOU USE IT FOR? IN WHAT WAYS DOES IT HELP YOU?

I'd say that's the only positive thing is connecting with people that you haven't in years, since high school or whenever that you would always love to talk to them but you just have no idea how to get a hold of them.

Right.

And people I have lost their information...I have friends who are like, I saw so and so on My Space and kicked it to me. I mean I have like thirty friends on there.

In the back of my head I'm just thinking I met a girl in Hermosa Beach and I didn't even like remember her or nothing and she called me the next day and she's like it's Regina. Some of your My Space friend requests, she sent me a friend request, and I'm like oh my gosh, the Asian chic. I was just like, what would I do without My Space?

That's how I share my pictures with my friends. We upload our images and build little profile notebooks or albums and share pictures. That's how we do our pictures now.

Do you let other people get on your page?

No, it's private.

MODERATOR-I WANT TO SHIFT GEARS A LITTLE BIT AND TALK ABOUT THE LEADERSHIP IN OUR COUNTRY. I'M TALKING ABOUT POLITICAL, CORPORATE, ALL THE LEADERSHIP ACROSS THE COUNTRY. HOW DO YOU RATE THE LEADERSHIP IN OUR COUNTRY?

That has a big problem to do with us.
Absolutely.
And our generation. We don't do anything. We don't have any sort of community. Something is bad, we don't come together and try to stand up. That's a problem.
That's how a lot of things happened in the 60's that changed the whole USA. People just don't do that anymore.
We are all involved with our immediate success stuff.
Yeah.
If we do try to rally or are against it, we are put in jail.
It really doesn't matter because I don't think anything gets accomplished anyway.



Exactly.

Unless you've got money to pay one of them off.

Like the march for immigration and all that stuff...

That's been four or five years and they've done nothing about that. Bush will be out of office and it still won't be taken care of.

Yeah.

And everybody will be preaching about what they are going to do about it and giving all that or whatever...none of them step up to the plate. Nothing is going to get taken care of. It's going to keep going on and on.

Is the next topic going to be religion? I want to leave the room before this gets nasty.

MODERATOR—NO, WE ARE NOT GOING TO RELIGION.

I just think right now it's not at its best obviously. I just don't understand how the president got re-elected.

Or how he got elected in the first place.

Yeah.

How did he get re-elected, that's what I don't understand. Whoever is up there is going to be just another puppet for corporate...

We hope not.

That's what we are all praying for, right?

Something revolutionary needs to happen in order to get change. That's the way the American custom is, it's the mighty dollar.

It's not so mighty anymore.

MODERATOR—CAN YOU POINT TO ANY EXAMPLES OF THE KIND OF LEADERSHIP THAT YOU WOULD WANT TO SEE?

I would say an example is Katrina. Something bad happens, so we all come together. Why does something bad have to happen for us to all come together? It seems like that community needed

That's why we represent different parties. They support their party and everything their party represents. I don't know too much about it. MODERATOR—SPEAKING OF THE THINGS THAT THEY TALK ABOUT, ONE OF THE THINGS WE'VE HEARD A LOT ABOUT ARE SOCIAL ISSUES, GAY MARRIAGE, ABORTION, STEM CELL RESEARCH. DO YOU THINK THAT THESE ARE THE ISSUES THAT SHOULD BE PLAYING SUCH A BIG ROLE IN OUR CAMPAIGNS AND STUFF?

It depends upon the type of leadership they hold. As far as the president, he shouldn't be too concerned about it. He's got bigger things going on. But maybe Arnold Schwarzenegger, as a state or whatever, maybe he should be worried about stuff like that. Like medical marijuana and stuff, I don't think the federal government should be so worried about it, maybe just the state.

MODERATOR—MORE THAN HALF OF YOU WENT WITH "C", THE RISING COST OF HEALTHCARE AND THE GROWING NUMBER OF UNINSURED. WHY DOES THAT ONE RISE SO HIGH FOR YOU GUYS?

Health insurance is so important, but it's so expensive. I'm uninsured because I can't afford it.

Either I have to be a full-time student and be under my parent's insurance, and if we are not, then we are shit out of luck and we have to pay for it ourselves. And living in LA with car accidents and everything, you need health insurance.

The insurance companies, it's a big scam.

That's one of the roots of the problem.

MODERATOR—THEY TAKE THE MONEY FROM THE LOBBYISTS AND SPECIAL INTERESTS TO GET RE-ELECTED. AND SO, THEN THEY SPEND ALL THAT MONEY TRYING TO CONVINCE US AS VOTERS TO RE-ELECT THEM. WHY COULDN'T WE HOLD THEM ACCOUNTABLE AND SAY YOU TAKE THE MONEY AND YOU DO WHAT THEY DO AND THEN WE ARE NOT GOING TO RE-ELECT YOU. WHY IS IT THAT THESE GUYS ARE REWARDED BY TAKING ALL THIS MONEY BY GETTING RE-ELECTED?

MODERATOR—LET'S TALK ABOUT A COUPLE OTHER ONES. "A", AMERICA'S DEPENDENCE ON FOREIGN OILS....WHAT'S SO IMPORTANT ABOUT THIS ISSUE?

Half of my paycheck goes to that department. Gas is so expensive and it's polluting our world. It's controlling us.

(end of side)

Half of the reason we are at war is because of oil. And if we didn't need oil, we'd be on something else. We don't know what it would be on. It's terrible.

Take over the Middle East just so we can have their oil. There are other options out there.

Yeah, but does it get more fun than that?

Like Brazil, for instance, is completely ...it's self reliant. Like if Brazil can accomplish something like that, why can't America? Not that America is better than Brazil, but I'm just saying that we should have the same resources as Brazil has to accomplish the same thing where they are self sustaining as far as their oil and fossil fuels.

MODERATOR—DO YOU THINK THE OIL COMPANIES ARE BASICALLY WAR PROFITEERS?

They certainly play a large role in it. There are a lot of pieces to the puzzle, but I'm sure they are a pretty large one.

Yes.

It comes with power.

Cheney worked with oil before he worked with Bush. He's still working with oil. So if you are a big name you are in oil.

And what governor became president of what state and what state has the largest oil refineries?

Absolutely. It's just not a coincidence obviously.

MODERATOR—LET'S TALK ABOUT "B," THE DECLINING QUALITY AND RISING INEQUALITY IN AMERICA'S PUBLIC EDUCATION SYSTEM.



What frightens me is that I read a poll recently where 27% and it doesn't sound like a big number actually, 27% of Americans could not name our vice president. There was another poll recently done where I can't remember the exact numbers, but some astounding number could not tell you what year 9/11 happened in. This is all about education. The people that were being asked are nineteen and twenty-year-olds and they were fifteen when 9/11 happened. And they were being educated when Dick Cheney was elected vice president. They don't know. Public education is a mess, especially in LA.

I think it's the cost of education too. It costs thousands and thousands of dollars to get a good education. But half of my friends who have diplomas from universities aren't using their diploma. What's the purpose of going to school when we are not going to use it when we can make lots of money and not have a diploma?

People are almost required to have college degrees now to get jobs. They bury themselves in debt. They get hired knowing that they have buried themselves in debt and they need to be able to get out of that debt and they need to be able to have insurance. That's a huge factor. It all ties into each other.

I don't understand why, for me personally, it's not about the diploma. It's about the knowledge that I gain from the education in school. That's the most important thing.

Great, you want to make more money, go to Harvard or Stamford or wherever you want, but the point is that you go to school to gain knowledge. And it's knowledge that I think is priceless, not the piece of paper that says you graduated with the diploma. I know a lot of people that have cheated their way through college. They didn't even learn anything. They have a diploma from UCLA. That's great, but you haven't learned anything.

Have you seen like Jay Leon's street walking? You know how he asks people questions, and these are very basic questions, like capitals of states or different countries and people don't know anything. They'll be like, on what continent is Egypt located and nobody knew. And it's like, oh my God, that's like a second grade question. And the LA Times itself is written at a sixth grade level. It doesn't say a lot about our public that we are falling so far behind all the other countries. And no money is put into education, kind of like the public health system.

MODERATOR—HOW DID WE GET TO THIS POINT?

I think schools have just kind of let people slide on by though too. You just go through the system. Even myself, I never graduated high school, I never did anything. I just kind of slid right through and I don't even know how I made it through the eighth grade. I've not a clue in the world. One thing I just learned from my own personal experience, I've learned self educational, not a formal education, self education and making a fortune.

It comes down to people not caring and money. Teachers, they just want to get their paycheck and can't wait for 3:30 when the bell rings.



I think there is something to what Demetri said too. I think there's a lot of value placed on the piece of paper and not enough value placed on the knowledge itself.

You get a degree and you go into something like sales and you go for a two-month course and you get taught to do what the job specifies.

Yeah.

That's the truth.

MODERATOR—THIS STATEMENT TALKED ABOUT INEQUALITY IN AMERICA'S EDUCATION SYSTEM. THE WAY THE SCHOOLS ARE FUNDED...

People in poor neighborhoods are going to get a poor education and people in more affluent ones are going to get a better education.

MODERATOR—RIGHT, THE WAY EDUCATION IS FUNDED AREAS THAT HAVE A HIGH TAX BASE AND PEOPLE MAKE A LOT OF MONEY, THE SCHOOLS HAVE MORE MONEY. AREAS OF LOWER INCOME, LESS MONEY TO THE SCHOOLS. DO YOU THINK THAT THAT STRUCTURAL INEQUALITY IS A PROBLEM? DO YOU THINK THAT PEOPLE FROM WEALTHIER AREAS SHOULD ACTUALLY BE SUBSIDIZING?

Yes.

Absolutely.

I want to know why the Beverly Hills Police Department was like a \$110 million dollar project and then you look at LA County and they probably haven't rebuilt any of their police departments in forty years. And why are these guys driving Suburbans and every like two years they are new ones. And they can't get enough squad cars or police officers in LA County to handle what they need. It's a big problem.

I live in North Hollywood which is bordered by Van Nuys on one side and Studio City on the other side. And the vast difference is blatant and marked and undeniable. You look at Van Nuys and you see the schools in these neighborhoods that are falling apart. And then you look at Studio City where these wealthy people live and you've got a lot of people who work in the industry and television and movies and these big houses and these really nice magnet schools, and yes there is definitely an inequality there and it definitely needs to be addressed. Call me a socialist or whatever, I think there is nothing wrong with some of the people from Studio City taking a little more out of their pocket to help out the poor people in Van Nuys.

But it's not helping them directly, so that's why the are not doing that.

Yeah, so they don't want to spend that money.



It's not directly affecting them and their children.

It is, I think.

But they don't see it.

You want to make the world around you a better place. Just like you can't isolate yourself and just be like I'm going to stay in Studio City. As soon as you cross over into Van Nuys you are going to be dealing with idiots. That's what I'm saying. You don't want that to happen so therefore you should always contribute.

Yeah, but how many times have you donated money and you really have no idea where that went. That's been a fact that it goes in someone else's pocket.

And you want to actually hand your money and put it in that account.

Yeah, but have you ever seen what the presidents of these non-profits make a year?

They are allowed to only claim 10% of what they collect. You donate \$100, \$10 of your \$100 is going to that charity. The other \$90 is going to them. I think that's ridiculous.

MODERATOR—LOOK AT THIS LIST, DO YOU SEE PROGRESS BEING MADE?

"A." I think it's good we are at least talking about that.

Yeah, "A."

That's at least making a move. You see a lot of these car companies going with not just hybrids now, but they are...

It's the bio-diesel fuel.

God bless Al Gore for that.

One of my best friends is the president of the LA based bio-diesel fuel and it's huge now. He started five years ago with three people and now it's a community of like seventy-five and they travel everywhere. And I think it's amazing what they are doing. There is that bio-diesel in Westwood. There is one gas station in LA that offers bio-diesel. It's like \$4.50 a gallon, but still....

MODERATOR—OTHER PLACES YOU'VE SEEN ANY PROGRESS?

A lot of this stuff isn't sexy. It's not television. For instance, the trade imbalance, which I think is kind of important. Try talking about that on the six o'clock news.



I was just thinking about the threat of terrorism. It has definitely progressed a little bit. It's not like where it is supposed to be, but I'm sure it's a lot better than it was back on 9/11. I think it's gotten better.

I don't know about that one. I'm just hoping....I used to do a lot of counter terrorism work and I got to meet with a lot of heads of consulates and I just think the battle for terror is in the wrong places. I don't think they are targeting as much of what is counter terrorism as it is pro US money and territory. It's the threat of terrorists. They are not really going after the real deal.

MODERATOR—WHERE DOES THE LEADERSHIP COME FROM? HOW DO YOU TURN THE CORNER AND START MAKING PROGRESS?

(many talking at once)

It's going to take a long time. You need to start with education with your kids.

We have no choice right now but to choose the leaders that want to run for president and what not. How do we go about changing that within ten, twenty, thirty, forty, fifty years time? We are not going to wake up and be like, get out of here, Al Gore get out of here, whoever is even running right now because we really have no choice. These guys are already there and they've built themselves up. And there are guys who are going to follow them already too. What we have to worry about is who is going to follow them twenty or thirty or forty years from now, what their values are. Realistically, we are not going to get rid of Barack Obama or we are not going to...

MODERATOR—DO THE REST OF YOU THINK THAT IT'S GOING TO TAKE THAT LONG TO TURN THINGS AROUND AND START MAKING PROGRESS ON THESE THINGS?

Like I said before, I think people need to ban together in groups and really tackle these issues. Then again, look at illegal immigration. That was a huge thing in Los Angeles where millions of people got together and protested. Look what's that done? What did that accomplish? Nothing. So it comes back to the point of, at least from where I stand, what the hell does it really matter? What can any of us do?

MODERATOR—THE REASON I KEEP TALKING ABOUT YOUR GENERATION BECAUSE YOUR GENERATION OF PEOPLE UNDER THIRTY IS BY FAR THE LARGEST GENERATION IN AMERICAN HISTORY. YOU ARE CHILDREN OF THE BABY BOOMERS WHO WERE THE LARGEST AND IT'S GOING TO BE JUST A MASSIVE GENERATION. IN A FEW YEARS YOU GUYS WILL REPRESENT ONE OUT OF EVERY THREE VOTERS IN THE COUNTRY. BY SHEER NUMBERS, IF YOU WANTED TO GET UNITED, YOU COULD OBVIOUSLY INFLUENCE A LOT OF ELECTIONS. YOU'VE GOT THE NUMBERS TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE. SO HOW DO



YOU GET PEOPLE TO MOVE IN THE SAME DIRECTION? HOW DO YOU GET THEM CARING ABOUT THIS KIND OF STUFF AND MOVING ON IT?

I think you need to combine it with things that we are interested in now like entertainment. MTV does that Rock the Vote. Every time there's an election, they bring like music groups together and they bring things that we like, but also talk about the issues and to give you an opinion, to give you what is out there, are you for it or against it? I think that's a great....when I heard about the Rock the Vote, I think that's a great way for people our age to get together and talk about serious things that are going on in the world besides what music band is playing.

MODERATOR—DO THOSE PEOPLE SHOWING UP AT THE CONCERT TRANSLATE INTO ACTION OR ARE THEY JUST GOING TO THE CONCERT?

It depends upon how serious they are. Once again, it boils down to that one single individual. It's all different. You think back in the 60's, I'm sure it's different back in the hippie days, but I'm sure some hippies were just hippies to go out and party and some were like, hey we really want peace.

I think we get every one of our age group to donate \$10 and create a lobby of our own to push the government in the right direction, maybe back our own president.

In our country, the government is not afraid of the people. You look at other countries and when people are protesting, the government is actually afraid of the people. Some people have a say in that. I don't think people really have a say in this country.

I think there should be a mandatory draft and that will get discipline in most of the young Americans. That will in turn make sure that all the issues are going to affect everyone, from the richest to the poorest.

Yeah, but what if we don't agree?

It doesn't matter. You are an American so you have to all be on the same boat. As an American, if you choose to live in America and be an American you need to be on the same boat. If you believe in the rights of Americans, if you believe in the Constitution, then you have to do the same thing. You have to go by it. It's your decision. If you don't want to, then you have to move. Move to another country where you agree with their policies. But if you want to live in America, you have to live by their policies and you have to defend their policies. And you have to change the policies in order to adapt to the times which we are in. If you are...

MODERATOR—YOU ARE SAYING THAT IF EVERYBODY'S BUTTS ARE ON THE LINE, THEN THEY WOULD BE MORE LIKELY TO CHANGE THINGS. YOU ARE NOT GOING TO GO TO WAR FOR BS REASONS, FOR MINISCULE REASONS. YOU ARE GOING TO GO TO WAR WHEN IT REALLY MATTERS, WHEN IT'S REALLY LIKE...

That's right.



And everything else is going to in turn follow.

Lower the voting age to sixteen. I think that's a pretty radical extreme thing to do, but I think we'd get a lot of media coverage. And I think that as a result of the media coverage, those kids would actually vote and maybe it would actually be a step in the right direction of getting people to care.

I remember when I turned eighteen I was like, yes, I can vote now. It was like one of those cool things to do and if you could do it at sixteen, I think I'd be more interested.

Who believes in voting? It's all computerized. I don't trust the voting ballots. Look at what happened with George W. Bush in Florida. I don't trust it for a second.

That's a fair point.

Yes it is.

Realistically, basically it's already in the system where these politicians are already raising kids with their values and they have the money and the campaigns and everything. Look how George Bush and then his son comes in. It's just all in the family. They are already like a part of that whole environment. Just like if you grew up with a family that has clubs and you promote for clubs, your parents promote for clubs, but realistically that's the environment you grew up in, those are the values that you have. I think that's how it is with politics too. It's really hard to emerge yourself as a single individual into that environment because it's already just like a cult.

MODERATOR—FLIP TO HANDOUT #2. FIRST THING I WANT TO TALK ABOUT IS HEALTHCARE. WE'VE GOT A STATEMENT HERE, I'LL READ IT OUT LOUD, UNDERLINE ANYTHING THAT JUMPS OUT AT YOU.

EACH NEW GENERATION IS SUFFERING AN EPIDEMIC OF CHRONIC PREVENTABLE DISEASES DUE TO A POLLUTED ENVIRONMENT, A LACK OF BASIC HEALTHCARE AND THE POISONS WE FEED THEM EVERYDAY. EVERY CHILD IN AMERICA, REGARDLESS OF RACE, CLASS OR INCOME SHOULD HAVE FULL HEALTH COVERAGE AND PROPER NUTRITION. PARENTS MUST BE TAUGHT THE IMPACT OF PREVENTIVE CARE AND PROPER NOURISHMENT WILL HAVE ON A CHILD. IF WE CONTINUE TO SPEND MORE AND MORE MONEY ON HEALTHCARE, WITHOUT ADDRESSING THE ROOT CAUSES OF THIS CRISIS, WE WILL ONLY WEAKEN OUR ECONOMY AND CONDEMN MILLIONS MORE CHILDREN TO SUFFERING AND DISEASES.

WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THAT STATEMENT?

I agree.



I underlined every child in America, that's pretty strong. Not just some child, not the rich ones, not the poor ones, but every child.

I thought poison was a good word.

MODERATOR—DO YOU AGREE WITH THAT FIRST STATEMENT THAT WE'VE GOT AN EPIDEMIC OF PREVENTABLE DISEASES?

Yeah.

Reading between the lines, the poisons that we feed them every day, it's like the chemicals that you get in the candy and the chips, all the stuff that we feed our kids because it's easy and it's quick. And that's what I heard in the statement, condemning the obesity epidemic. Yeah, I think it's to be dealt with. It's a problem.

It's the chemicals that are in everything we drink.

The preservatives.

You look at the stuff on the back and you can't even pronounce it and you look it up and you are like, oh my God.

Coca-Cola it's like....and the McDonald's double cheeseburger, they'll market that as being the greatest thing in the world, but the nutritional facts are absolutely disgusting.

Right.

Even like Big Mac's have 56 grams of protein. If you are going to the gym and working on and want to get bigger, you are not going to eat a Big Mac for a source of protein.

The hell of it is, and I can't speak for the rest of you, I know that all of that is true, but if I'm in a rush to get someplace I'll stop at Taco Bell or whatever. You know what I'm saying? It's fast. It's easy. I've got to go. I've got someplace to be. And I know that. I know it's not healthy, I know it's not right.

Quick and cheap.

Exactly. Who can argue with that?

It's funny too because you go outside the US and everyone has got like crazy lunch breaks. You go in the middle of the day on the main streets and everyone is just hanging out, a cup of coffee, this and that. People aren't in as much of a rush as the US is.

When you go to Germany, they have three-hour lunch breaks. You go home, take a nap. I worked there for a year and it was amazing. I was like, I want to live here.



There's another country like Norway or Sweden or something where they only work like 32 hours a week. It's just different. No, they only work six hour days, not eight hour days.

MODERATOR—ALRIGHT, WHAT ABOUT EVERY CHILD IN AMERICA REGARDLESS OF RACE, CLASS OR INCOME SHOULD HAVE FULL HEALTHCARE.....DO YOU AGREE WITH THAT?

Yes.		
Yes.		
Absolutely, yeah.		
If they are citizens.		
Yes.		

MODERATOR—WHAT DO THE REST OF YOU THINK ABOUT THAT?

That's where it's iffy. I'm totally against people who are not born and raised....I don't know. I'm a white Caucasian girl who was born in LA. I grew up in Whittier. I was the only white girl in my class. That's fine, but then I moved to Agora, a total Jewish community and I was not around interracial differences. If I go to McDonald's and the lady doesn't know how to say cheeseburger correctly or how to say dollar, I get pissed off. If you don't know English, I get pissed off. This is America, I feel like you should know English.

MODERATOR—BUT TO THE POINT OF WHETHER ALL KIDS SHOULD HAVE COVERAGE OR NOT?

Back to that, okay, well those people come here and have kids. Okay, technically that kid is an American citizen. So, I don't know.

That's the anchor baby thing. I'm always in the minority on this issue. Everybody is much more stringent on illegal immigration than I am. I think this country is built on immigration. I think those kids, even if they are illegal, how are you going to look a child in the face and say I can't fix you. I'm not allowed.

Yeah, that's the thing, if they are cut and bleeding in the street you can't just leave them, oh sorry...but on the flip side, it's a tough issue.

Yeah, illegal immigration is hard.

If you were in their country, how would they treat you?



A lot of countries you can just cruise in and be like, help me, I'm sick or hurt.

Yeah, but would you tell a twenty-year-old person who is this illegal immigrant that they can't get coverage?

This is something else a lot of people are going to take me to task on, but in America aren't we supposed to be better? Isn't that what we are built on, the idea that we handle those things better than other countries?

Yeah, if they pay taxes. If they put into it, absolutely. But the problem is...

It's pointless. I think the economy in general is suffering.

You've got to pay your dues.

MODERATOR—LET'S LOOK AT ANOTHER ISSUE, FLIP TO HANDOUT #3. THIS ONE IS GOING TO DEAL WITH ENERGY AND THE ENVIRONMENT.

OUR DEPENDENCE ON FOREIGN OIL AND FOSSIL FUELS IS THE GREATEST THREAT TO OUR NATIONAL SECURITY AND OUR QUALITY OF LIFE AND OUR ECONOMIC FUTURE. THAT'S WHY WE MUST LAUNCH A MASSIVE CONCERTED NATIONAL EFFORT, SIMILAR TO THE APOLLO PROGRAM THAT PUT A MAN ON THE MOON, WITH THE GOAL OF MOVING AMERICA BEYOND FOSSIL FUELS AND INVENTING THE NEXT GENERATION OF ENERGY BASED ON NEW TECHNOLOGIES SUCH AS HYDROGEN OR FUSION. THIS PLAN WOULD REQUIRE A HUGE NATIONAL INVESTMENT, BUT WOULD PRODUCE MILLIONS OF NEW JOBS, DRAMATICALLY REDUCE ENVIRONMENTAL DAMAGE AND FREE US FROM OUR DEPENDENCE ON FOREIGN OIL THAT SUBSIDIZES REGIMES WHO SUPPORT THE TERRORISTS WHO ARE TARGETING US.

WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THAT STATEMENT?

Absolutely. Dead on.

That's essentially the whole thing.

MODERATOR—THE GREATEST THREAT TO OUR SECURITY AND QUALITY OF LIFE....

Absolutely.

Yeah. Every part of this is pretty on.

I especially like the part about a massive concerted national effort. If you have somebody like Kennedy who said we are going to go to the moon and we are going to do it by the end of this



decade. And if you have a politician with that kind of charisma and media savvy who can go on television and has the guts to say that and stand up to the oil companies and say, we are going to make you guys obsolete, I think that people would really respond. But nobody is going to do that.

MODERATOR—HOW DOES THIS HAPPEN? IS IT ALL GOVERNMENT, IS IT JUST

The government will not make any of this happen.

Private investment. People have to invest.

Yeah.

MODERATOR—INVEST IN WHO? INVEST IN WHAT?

Invest in new energy, companies that are...instead of...here's a small step, instead of going and buying your gas at Chevron, I buy it at BP because BP is all domestic oil. Ideally it would be good if we got off oil altogether, but that's not going to happen right now, so you start with that small step. Instead of buying your gas at ARCO, you buy it at BP. And maybe you buy stock in a company that's...not a lot of stock, but some stock in a company that is working on hydrogen or fusion.

I do see a lot of corporate companies going green in the past like two years. I personally worked with Toyota and everything went green with them. All their paper is all recycled paper. Everything they put out has like something green about it. And I know the cars, they were working on the hydrogen thing. There was definitely a big push in that company for a greener environment.

MODERATOR—THIS THING SAYS THAT WE'VE GOT TO JUMP AHEAD, THAT WE'VE GOT TO GET BEYOND FOSSIL FUELS. THERE'S A LOT OF FOCUS ON ETHANOL AND BIO-DIESELS AND STUFF LIKE THAT. THIS THING IS SAYING YOU'VE GOT TO GO ALL THE WAY, YOU'VE GOT TO MAKE A BIG JUMP TO THE NEXT GENERATION. DO YOU AGREE WITH THAT?

Yeah. You spend as much fossil fuels making ethanol viable as you do driving your car with regular fossil fuels so you might as well skip that stuff and go to the more advanced technologies.

MODERATOR—ALRIGHT, HOW DO YOU MAKE IT HAPPEN AND WHAT ROLE CAN YOUR GENERATION PLAY IN MAKING THIS HAPPEN?

Again, I think investment. I think getting the word out.

MODERATOR—WOULD YOU GUYS BE WILLING TO LET YOUR WALLETS DO THE TALKING FOR YOU TO INVEST IN COMPANIES LIKE THAT OR SUPPORT



COMPANIES THAT WERE MAKING THAT EFFORT OR TO ELECT POLITICIANS WHO SAID THAT THEY WOULD DO THIS?

If a politician said this, he or she would have my vote immediately.

I would love to invest in a company if it was starting out like at \$2 a share and it was going to do great things for the world.

Something like that, I would invest without trying to get a profit out of it. And we may last another hundred years on this planet. It's worth it.

I think if we knew we were going to get results, then we would.

But are we going from depending on one thing to depending on another thing? Isn't it going to lead eventually to the same thing?

I think so.

MODERATOR—HOW MUCH OF A DIFFERENCE CAN AN INDIVIDUAL ACTION REALLY MAKE?

It depends how far they push. I mean an individual like Martin Luther King, look what he did on his own. Realistically, you always have to have your supporters and stuff, but you can do anything in the world.

A video comes up on You Tube and it's funny as shit, ten people might send it to you and you might send it out to another ten people. It's as easy as that. A video can get 100,000 hits in like a week.

I think that all has to do with how much someone really wants it. Realistically, you can have anything in life if you have a vision for it, but you have to have a vision. And sure enough, a lot of people give up on that vision after they get knocked down so many times.

If you are telling us that we are one third of the population, then yeah, that's one third of us doing it.

MODERATOR-THAT'S ASSUMING THAT YOU WOULD GET ALL ONE THIRD MOVING IN THE SAME DIRECTION. HOW DOES THAT HAPPEN?

Individual action is the most important thing and the only option you have. I don't know who said it, but a great journey starts with the first step. It's all about the individual action.

Yeah, you can't start anything without individual action.



And you can't really think of it that way. You can't really think of it as is what I'm doing going to help, you just kind of have to do it.

MODERATOR—THAT'S FAIR. WITH THAT IN MIND, SKIP HANDOUT #4 AND GO STRAIGHT TO HANDOUT #5. HERE'S A LIST OF INDIVIDUAL ACTIONS THAT PEOPLE CAN TAKE TO TRY TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN THEIR COMMUNITY, IN THE WORLD. PUT ALL THESE IN ONE OF THESE THREE CATEGORIES. THE FIRST COLUMN, MARK ALL THE THINGS THAT YOU HAVE DONE OR ARE DOING NOW. IN THE SECOND COLUMN MARK THE THINGS THAT YOU MAY NOT BE DOING RIGHT NOW, BUT YOU MAY BE LIKELY TO DO. IN THE THIRD COLUMN, MARK THE THINGS THAT YOU ARE NOT REAL LIKELY TO DO. WHAT ARE THE THINGS THAT YOU ARE DOING NOW OR HAVE DONE?

Voting.
Voting.
Voting.
Signing petitions.

Participating in public protests and volunteering.

I've done everything except the last three.

MODERATOR—ANYTHING ELSE THAT YOU HAVE DONE? DO YOU THINK THAT PUBLIC PROTESTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

I think so because if you show a mass group of people defending for something. I'm part of PETA and I've done my part with that. And it makes an impact. People write about it, people talk about it. It makes an impact. There are definitely things I don't do, but there are a few things that I would stand up and I feel strongly about.

Based on personal purchases and all that stuff, I used to be a union worker and it was kind of drilled into your head buy American, work American, all that stuff. I thought about it before I bought my truck out in Chicago. Hey, I've got to get an American made truck. That was something that was drilled into my head and it stayed in the back of my head when I bought stuff. Buy American.

MODERATOR—HOW MANY OF YOU SAID THAT YOU BASE YOUR BUYING DECISIONS ON A COMPANY'S POLITICAL OR SOCIAL...OKAY...HOW MANY PEOPLE WOULD DO THAT?

I would, depending on what the product is.



MODERATOR—DO YOU THINK THAT THAT MAKES A DIFFERENCE?

Τt	can.

Yeah.

MODERATOR—HOW?

If enough people join you in making that decision, absolutely.

I do that now. It depends on what company and what they are doing. Like for instance, Proctor and Gamble, they are notorious for the hideouswhat's the point of spraying hairspray around its eyeball. If you are dumb, you are going to get your eye. You shouldn't get that stuff in your eye anyway. It's like torturing animals and that's not okay with me for cosmetic purposes. There's no point to it. I don't like to buy products that sponsor that type of thing. Things like that....there are issues that I feel strongly about and I don't want to support them inadvertently by purchasing products. I know a lot of people that...and like he said with the Rock the Vote, you go to a lot of concerts, a lot of the bands also support causes like PETA and they'll hand you brochures and they'll talk to you about what it means to them and what the causes are and what the issues are. That's a good way to reach out to young Americans and let them know about ...not only like handing out gross looking pamphlets, but it's like what is the issue, why it's important and why you should care. That's what has gotten me involved. I didn't know. I used to buy whatever. I'd be like I saw it on TV and I kind of want it, and now it's like I kind of think about it. What does this represent? What is this company doing? What is this really about and is there another way?

MODERATOR—OTHER THINGS YOU GUYS WOULD BE LIKELY TO DO?

I said attending public meetings and writing to newspapers or our governor, things like that.

I've thought about running for office before, but the reason I decided not to is because I feel like it would be too easy to become part of the problem rather than part of the solution, at least at this point. The paradigm of social and governmental interactions, so I decided not to do that.

And your past.

Nobody is clean, especially not me.

Yeah.

I don't want my background splashed all over the five o'clock news.

Right.

I would love to and I stand for things I believe in, but again, people wouldn't vote for me.



You've got to pick a party then or you are not going to win. You know what I mean? I've got to be either a democrat or a republican. I mean I'm a registered democrat, but I don't want to be either.

MODERATOR—WHERE DOES THE LINE FALL BETWEEN THINGS YOU WOULD BE LIKELY TO DO AND THINGS YOU WOULDN'T BE LIKELY TO DO?

Running for office, that's a huge step. That's just like really putting yourself out there.

MODERATOR—AND THAT ONE IS OBVIOUS. THIS LIST KIND OF GOES FROM THE SMALLEST COMMITMENT TO THE BIGGEST COMMITMENT. WHAT IS THAT DIVIDING LINE?

Some of these are an actual job in a sense.

MODERATOR—ARE THOSE THE ONLY ONES YOU'D BE UNLIKELY TO DO?

Yeah.

For me, yeah.

Like attending public meetings, they happen all the time. You always see like, city council meeting this Friday. I've thought about going just to hear about what people are talking about and what's going on in our community. I lived in Atwater and they had to take five different times to vote for city council because no one was going.

That's incredible.

And it was a huge thing in the local newspaper. I was like, I think I want to go, but I didn't go.

I actually went to the city council meeting in Long Beach a few weeks ago because my neighbor wants to blow up the break line or something. Or the break wall or whatever so waves come into Long Beach and Belmont Shore. I thought it was pretty interesting. He's a part of this group with fifteen other people and they want to blow up the break wall and they go every week. I went and supported them and it was pretty boring. I never went again.

MODERATOR—LAST THING I'M GOING TO ASK YOU GUYS TO DO, FLIP TO HANDOUT #6 THERE. WE ARE NOT GOING TO TALK ABOUT THIS...
